Options for Serving Preschool Students

This chart outlines options for serving meals to preschool students enrolled in Colorado.

Qualifying family income can be established through determination of eligibility for free or reduced-price meals.

Participant Eligibility	 Children up to 5 years old Households will receive meal benefits based on their student's eligibility status (i.e. free, reduced-price or paid meals). Households may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals by submitting an income application or by participating in other assistance programs. UPK eligibility does not mean a child automatically qualifies for free meals If a SFA participates in the Healthy School Meals for All program, preschool students will also receive free meals. 	 Infants and children under age 13. Migrant children under age 15. Individuals with disabilities who receive care in a child care center where most participants are under age 18. Cost of meals can be part of tuition or charged as a separate fee

* A school district may not claim meals and snacks under the CACFP and NSLP/SBP for the same children over the same hours of the day. If a district offers an early childhood program (preschool or child care) and would like to serve those children snacks or meals through a federal child nutrition program, the district must choose to enroll the site through CACFP or through NSLP/SBP. The children cannot participate in both programs at the same time. For example, if a child is enrolled in an early childhood program and participates in NSLP/SBP, that child cannot also be enrolled in CACFP to receive an AM snack. Some scenarios of allowable vs. not allowable include:

Allowable:

A preschool program operates and has instructional time from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m.for one group of students and from 11:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. for another group of students and participates in the CACFP. The preschool program may offer breakfast and snack to the group of students that are there from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and lunch and snack to the group of students there from 11:30 am to 3:00pm.

OR

A preschool program operates and has instructional time from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and participates in NSLP/SBP. The preschool program may offer breakfast and lunch under NSLP/SBP. Breakfast must be served before 10:00 a.m. and lunch may not be served until after 10:00 a.m.

OR

A preschool program operates and has instructional time from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. for one group of children and from 11:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. for another group of students and participates in NSLP/SBP. The preschool program may offer breakfast and lunch for the group of children that are there from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and lunch to the children there from 11:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Breakfast must be served before 10:00 a.m. and lunch must be served between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.

OR

A center provides child care from 6:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. with preschool instructional time from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and participates in the CACFP. A student may receive up to two meals and one snack or two snacks and one meal while in care.

Not allowable:

A preschool program operates from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and participates in the CACFP and the NSLP/SBP. The preschool program serves children breakfast under the School Breakfast Program, midmorning snack under the CACFP, and lunch under the National School Lunch Program.
