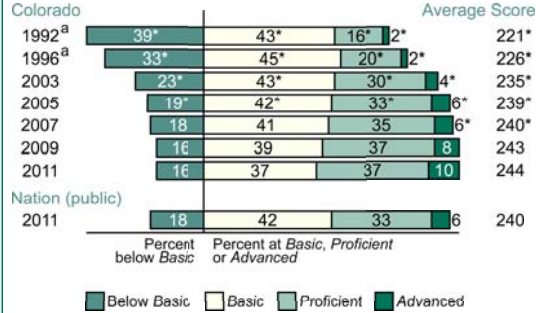


Overall Results

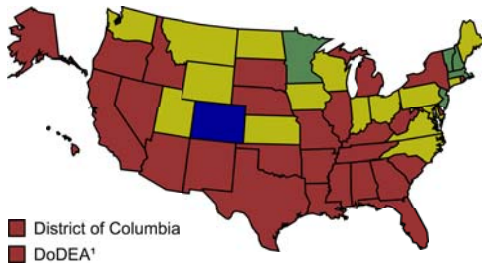
- In 2011, the average score of fourth-grade students in Colorado was 244. This was higher than the average score of 240 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Colorado in 2011 (244) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (243) and was higher than their average score in 1992 (221).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Colorado at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 40 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 1992 (40 points).
- The percentage of students in Colorado who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 47 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (45 percent) and was greater than that in 1992 (17 percent).
- The percentage of students in Colorado who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 84 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (84 percent) and was greater than that in 1992 (61 percent).

Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results



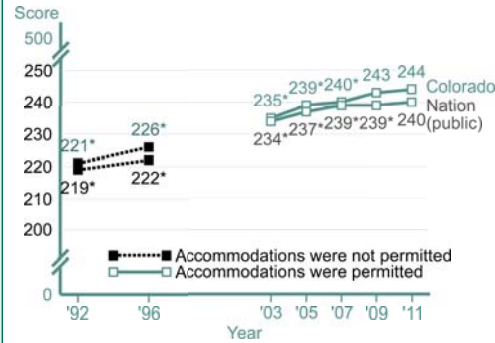

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 29 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1992 (28 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 24 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1992 (23 points).
- In 2011, male students in Colorado had an average score that was not significantly different from female students.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 25 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1996 (23 points).
